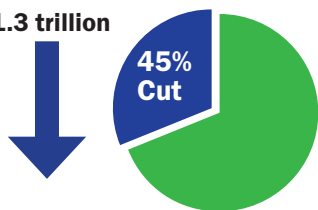


Impact of the President's Proposed Budget on People with Disabilities

Publicly-funded disability programs provide a critical lifeline that allow people with disabilities to live safely in their communities, work and contribute to community life, and avoid costly institutional settings. Proposed federal cuts this drastic threaten the lives and safety of people with disabilities across the country, including Wisconsin.

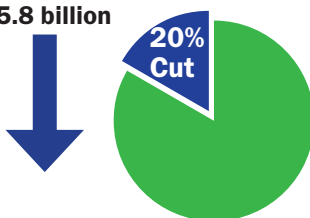
HEALTHCARE

\$1.3 trillion



Medicaid (MA): \$610 billion cut on top of an \$834 billion cut in the proposed American Health Care Act in next 10 years. Total proposed 45% Medicaid cut affecting 20 WI Medicaid programs (e.g. Family Care, IRIS, BadgerCare, MAPP, Katie Beckett, HealthCheck, Comprehensive Community Services, and more).

\$5.8 billion



Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP): 20% cut, putting coverage for thousands of WI children under age 19 using BadgerCare Plus at risk.

Fed \$ Eliminated



State Health Insurance Assistance Program (SHIP): Provides free local, in-depth, unbiased insurance counseling and assistance to Medicare beneficiaries, their families, and caregivers. WI SHIP funds the Medigap Helpline, the Disability Drug Benefits Helpline, and benefits specialists at local Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs).

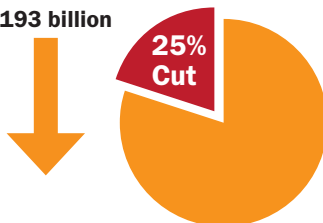
BENEFITS

\$72 billion



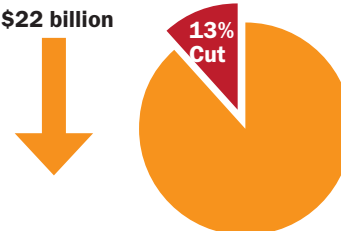
Social Security Disability Insurance (SSDI) and Supplemental Security Income (SSI) (\$50 billion cut to SSDI).

\$193 billion



SNAP (food stamps): 25% cut in next 10 years (FoodShare in WI).

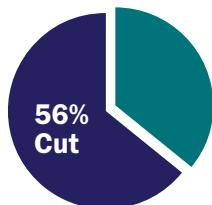
\$22 billion



Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) block grant: 13% cut in next 10 years (W-2 in WI).

PROGRAMS FOR PEOPLE WITH DISABILITIES

\$57 million



Zeroes out **State Councils on Developmental Disabilities, Independent Living and Traumatic Brain Injury** programs and creates a single state grant program with 56% less funding. In Wisconsin, cuts and combines the Board for People with Developmental Disabilities and the Independent Living Council of Wisconsin.

Fed \$ Eliminated



Special Olympics: eliminates federal funding.

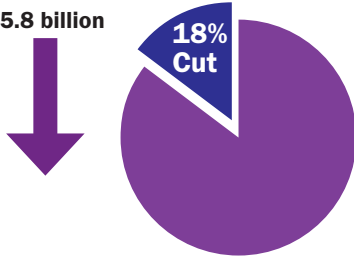

RESEARCH AND TRAINING

\$5.8 billion



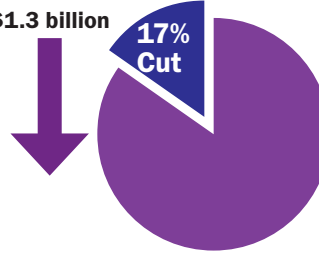
National Institutes of Health: 18% cut, including the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD).

\$47 million



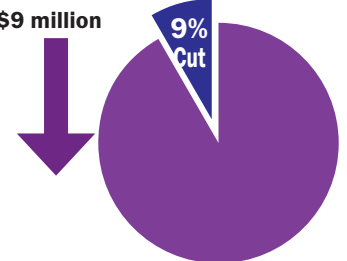
Autism CARES Act: cuts for research on health care and services, including training through Leadership Education in Neurodevelopmental and Other Related Disabilities (LEND).

\$1.3 billion



Centers for Disease Control (CDC): 17% cut, with cuts to National Center on Birth Defects and Developmental Disabilities (-\$35 million).

\$9 million



National Institute on Disability, Independent Living, and Rehabilitation Research: 9% cut to research on ways for people with disabilities to be active in their communities.

COMMUNITY, SOCIAL, AND LEGAL SERVICES

Fed \$ Eliminated



Community Services Block Grant (CSBG): Funds programs for job skills training, housing, and food assistance in WI.

Fed \$ Eliminated



Social Services Block Grants: Supports in WI include Community Living/Support Services, Supported Employment, Community Treatment Services, and Specialized Transportation.

Fed \$ Eliminated



Legal Services Corporation (LSC): which cuts \$5 million in WI for Legal Action of Wisconsin and Wisconsin Judicare to provide legal services to people with low incomes.

HOUSING ASSISTANCE

Fed \$ Eliminated



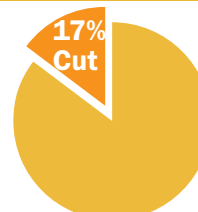
Low-Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP): Cuts funds to the Wisconsin Home Energy Assistance Program (WHEAP) to help low-income people pay heating bills.

Fed \$ Eliminated



National Housing Trust Fund: The Wisconsin Housing & Economic Development Authority (WHEDA) manages \$3 million WI gets to help people with extremely low incomes escape or avoid homelessness.

\$25 million



Section 811 Housing for People with Disabilities: 17% cut to affordable community-based housing for people with disabilities.

Fed \$ Eliminated



Community Development Block Grant: funds housing programs for people with low to moderate income. WI uses these funds for home modifications, including for people with disabilities.

EDUCATION AND EMPLOYMENT

\$9.2 billion



Education: 13% cut to overall education funding, teacher professional development, and after-school programs.

\$27.5 million



Cuts **Vocational Rehabilitation** funding for state supported employment grants
