

How a Bill Becomes a Law In Wisconsin

Overview of Legislative Process



- You identify a problem/issue and want it to change.
- You meet with your legislator to discuss your problem/issue.
- Legislator likes your idea and sends a proposal to the Legislative Reference Bureau (LRB).
- LRB writes the formal legal language.
- The idea is shared with other legislatives (co-sponsorship) and if they also like the idea and sign on.

Overview of Legislative Process



- The bill is introduced in the Senate and Assembly and and get bill numbers. Assembly Bill-AB and Senate Bill-SB
- ► The bill has committee hearing in both Assembly and Senate.
- The bill is passed out of committee and goes to the floor. (Executive Session)
- The Bill is passed in both Assembly and Senate. (Floor votes)
- The Bill goes to Governor for signature and becomes law.

Problem/Issue

- Children with disabilities are able to be secluded and restrained at school.
- Parents were often not informed of the use of seclusion and restraint.
- School were not required to report the yearly information to DPI.
- Disability Rights Wisconsin, Wisconsin Family Ties and WI Facets received contacts from families of children with disabilities about the inappropriate use of seclusion and restraint, lack of notice of the event, injuries, and unable to find their Districts information on seclusion and restraint.



Example: AB 585/SB 527 Changes to Seclusion and Restraint Law

- Parents contacted advocates about continuing issues with S/R.
- ▶ Disability Rights, Family Ties, and WI Facets gathered data for three years on S/R and created reports.
- ► The organizations held a press conference and families shared their stories.
- Stakeholders worked together on changes.
- Families contacted legislators about their experiences.
- ▶ A legislator decided to do something about it.

Analysis by the Legislative Reference Bureau

This bill makes changes to the law governing physical restraint and seclusion of pupils in schools.

Under current law, individuals who work in a public school, including a charter school, or a private school participating in the Special Needs Scholarship Program (SNSP school) may only use seclusion or physical restraint on a pupil at school if Description of Bill



What are the chances of success?

- In the last legislative session (2019-2020), 2263 bills were introduced and only 185 bills passed into law.
- ► This is a 50% decreases of billed passed from the previous two years.
- ► The legislature has not been in session since March.

How a Bill Dies?

- ► The committee it is assigned to doesn't hold a hearing.
- The committee never takes a vote in Executive Session
- ► The committee votes but it doesn't pass out of committee.
- ► The Rules Committee doesn't schedule the bill to go to the floor.
- The full Assembly or Senate vote against the bill.
- One of the houses fails to move the bill forward.
- ▶ The Governor veto's the bill.



What can you do to get a bill passed?

- Contact your legislator about an idea and meet with them to discuss the problem.
- ► Get other people who are interested in the issue come with you.
- Support the legislator through the process by offering any advice, suggestions on the bill.
- Contact your friends, people you know to contact their legislators to sign on to the bill.
- Testify at a hearing and tell your story and why this bill is important.
- Find other people to testify at the hearings.
- ► Talk to the press about your idea or write a letter to the editor or Op Ed.




