# Legislation has passed but there is still much work to do!

- Build awareness in communities and with businesses
- Provide opportunities for people with disabilities to explore interests and build skills in the community
- Support families to see possibilities and help address their concerns
- Support schools to follow best practices for transition services for youth as they prepare to leave school and enter adulthood
  - 1 paid job while in high school = 2x as likely to have a paid job after high school
  - 2 paid jobs while in high school = 5x as likely to have a paid job after high school
- Ensure state agencies working together to align efforts to increase competitive integrated employment

## **Employment First Partners**

- \* Community groups, schools, and organizations that engage their local communities to increase integrated employment opportunities.
- **SET Partners receive small grants from the WI BPDD to support their efforts.**
- ❖ Present to service clubs and business groups, organize community conversations, hold legislative events and town hall meetings, and educate people with disabilities and their families about having community jobs.
